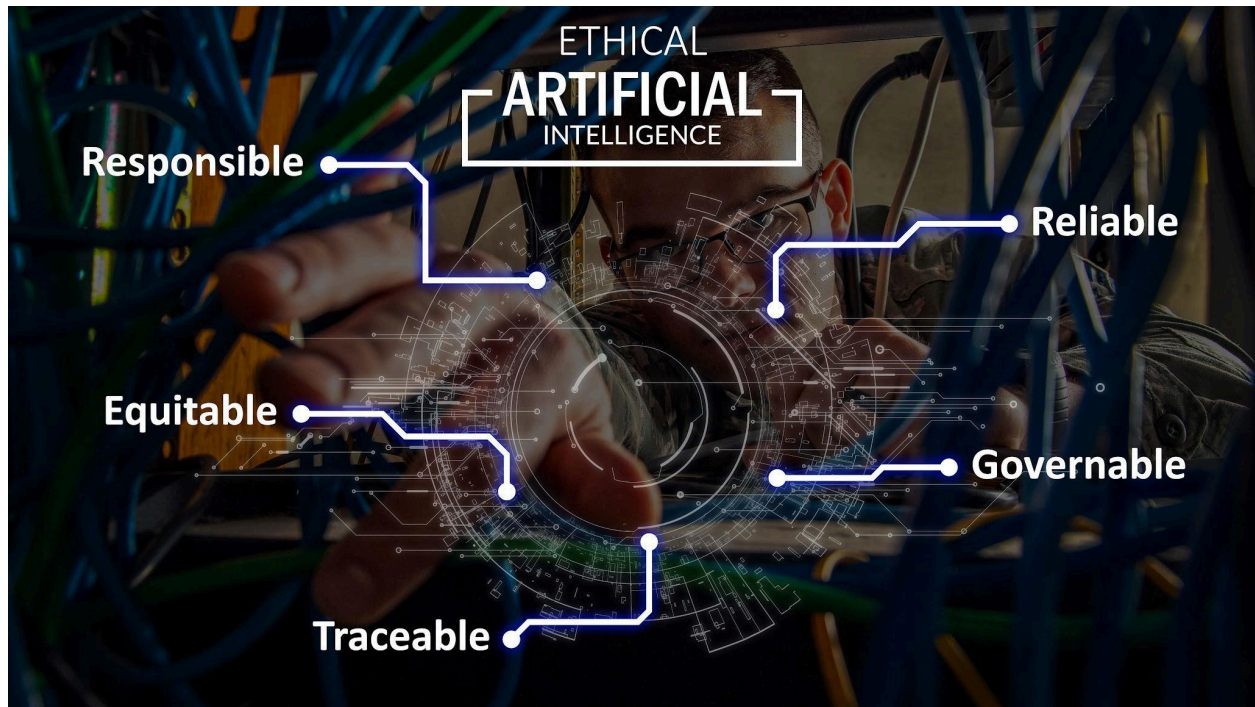


Voice, Framing, and Cultural Resonance in AI Storytelling: Fit-for-Purpose Notebook LM Studio Auditing for African Storytelling



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Purpose: To evaluate the narrative framing of AI-generated voices in Google's NotebookLM and identify design gaps that impact trust, credibility, and resonance, particularly in African and feminist newsrooms. The goal is to ensure that tools like NotebookLM are fit for purpose: capable of supporting high-impact, culturally grounded, and emotionally intelligent storytelling that reflects the values and expectations of the communities they serve, making uptake more seamless.

1) Executive Summary

This report examines gendered and cultural bias in the AI-generated voices featured in *The Sudan Conflict* podcast, created using Google's NotebookLM. It identifies a framing imbalance in how emotional labour and cognitive authority are distributed between a male and a female voice. Though presented as a dialogue, the male voice shapes the emotional journey and narrative transitions, while the female voice provides detailed, fact-driven analysis with little affective range.

In the episode of *The Sudan Conflict* podcast:

- The male voice speaks approximately 1,592 words
- The female voice speaks approximately 1,579 words

This means the speaking time is almost evenly split, with the man contributing just slightly more by word count (a difference of only 13 words). However, even with equal speaking time, the distribution of emotional vs cognitive labour remains imbalanced. The man takes on the role of emotional interpreter, guiding the listener's moral reactions, while the woman carries the factual and analytical burden. This reinforces narrative framing bias even in seemingly "equal" dialogue.

At first glance, this may appear to replicate a common pattern: men lead, women support. However, what makes this podcast noteworthy, and worth celebrating, is the emotional tone assigned to the male voice.

Rather than leaning into the traditional "rational male" model, the AI-generated man reacts with empathy, concern, and vulnerability. He pauses at injustice, expresses horror at atrocities, and becomes a guide not just in content, but in feeling. In many global and African media spaces where masculinity is still coded as emotionally detached or authoritative, this emotionally expressive man challenges a deep narrative bias. It introduces the possibility of softer masculinities, of men who hold space for grief, nuance, and moral clarity. This is not a flaw, it's a moment of design opportunity.

Still, the emotional flattening of the female voice is significant. She becomes a "data vessel," stripped of moral reaction, intuition, or relational tone. Her credibility is high, but her

presence is muted. In many African contexts, where women are traditionally the moral voice of communities, the keepers of feeling and context, this inversion risks detaching her from cultural trust.

In short:

- The man's emotional role is a welcome subversion of emotionally distant masculinity in AI and media.
- The woman's role, however, needs emotional depth to match her intellectual authority.
- Narrative equality is not about airtime, but affect, authorship, and emotional resonance.

This report recommends not just balancing how much each voice speaks, but redistributing narrative and emotional labour more equitably across genders, in ways that honour cultural nuance, support ethical AI design, and invite more inclusive modes of storytelling

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4) Recommendations to Google

- a. Balance narrative authority
 - Rotate opening/closing responsibilities
 - Alternate who introduces new topics or emotional pivots throughout conversation
- b. Redistribute emotional labour
 - Write emotionally responsive lines for the female voice
 - Let her express concern, surprise, moral outrage , not just data where she is positioned as an expert. Let the voice logic reflect *regional storytelling traditions*, especially where female-coded voices carry communal emotion and wisdom
- c. Test for cultural resonance, not just content neutrality
 - Bias audits should evaluate affective delivery, not just accuracy. Who is trusted? Who is heard?
- d. Introduce Afrocentric voice archetypes urgently
 - Voices that sound like they are grounded in African sonic identity

5) Closing Note

Framing is cultural work. As voice AI expands into diverse contexts, narrative equity will require as much attention as technical accuracy. This means making space for voices that inform *and* connect, that carry the data, and carry the weight.

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
